Property, business-license taxes continue dropping in St. Matthews

Better service at lower cost is becoming a hallmark of St. Matthews government.

In 1989, the city's property tax rate was .2995 (nearly 30 cents) per \$100 of assessed valuation, with a 15 percent discount for timely payment. In 1990 the rate dropped to 26 cents per \$100, and in 1991 the discount was raised to 25 percent. In 1992 the property tax went to 25 cents, and in 1994 it dropped again, to 23 cents per \$100. This year the City Council approved a 1995 tax

rate of just 22 cents per \$100, and raised the paid-on-time discount to 40 percent.

(Speaking of property taxes: If you will be 65 years old this year and your St. Matthews home is your primary residence, please stop by to fill out a Homestead Exemption application. More good news: The exemption this year is \$23,100, up from \$18,400 in 1989.)

The council is also planning to reduce the city's business-license tax by about 50 percent this year.

Councilman William O'Connell dies after surgery at age 79

St. Matthews councilman William John O'Connell Sr., 79, died on July 11 at Baptist Hospital East, of complications of vascular surgery.

O'Connell, a native of Chicago, was a retired regional sales manager for Diamond Crystal Salt Co., where he worked for 38 years. He had been a council member since 1985. His speech had been impaired by the effects of a stroke, and in recent months he had used a wheelchair.

During the July 11 meeting of the council, Mayor Art Draut described O'Connell as a good friend and a loyal city servant who was known for his solid business sense and his faithful attendance at council meetings.

O'Connell was a co-founder and first president of the Trinity High School Boosters Association and a former board member of the St. Joseph Orphan Society. He was an Army veteran of World War II and a member of the American Legion Zachary Taylor Post. He is survived by his wife, the former Anne-Marie Georgot, five sons, two daughters, 15 grandchildren and three step-grandchildren.

The council has 30 days from O'Connell's death to appoint someone to fill the vacancy until the November election. Anyone interested in running for the council post has until 4 p.m. on Aug. 8 to file with the Jefferson County

Recycling:

What goes around stops coming around

St. Matthews residents have kept more than 356,520 pounds of garbage out of area landfills in just the first four months of this year.

Keep up the good work. Recycling is good today for a better tomorrow.

What to recycle:

Newspapers.
No magazines or glossy paper. (Keep newspapers as dry as possible.)

Glass bottles and jars. (No window glass, light bulbs, dishware, etc.)

Tin cans.

Aluminum cans. (No aluminum foil, pie tins, etc.)

Plastic bottles and jugs. (Remove lids.)

Materials for recycling are picked up the same day as regular trash. Place container at street curb.

Laidlaw is now picking up "white goods" (discarded washers, dryers,

stoves and refrigerators) for recycling at no charge. The company also drains and recycles freon from refrigerators. (In the past, there was a \$10 charge for picking up and disposing of such items, and freon had to be removed at the homeowners' expense.)

Place white goods

at the curb on the second Wednesday of every month.

The St. Matthews Fire District voted at its regular meeting on June 8 to give \$33,000 to a program that helps retired volunteer firemen.

The station makes an annual donation to the Voluntary Fireman's Insurance Service, which allocates funds for volunteer firefighters and is similar to a retirement fund. A firefighter becomes eligible after 10 years of service, and receives the money after retirement. For every year of service over 10 years, each eligible firefighter receives \$30 more per month.


St. MAM has a new home

St. Matthews Area Ministries (St. MAM) has moved into new facilities at Beechwood Baptist Church, 201 Biltmore Road.

The offices and church are in Beechwood Village, directly across from the Shelbyville Road Plaza. The church has made available about 1,500 square feet of space, allowing for a consolidation of Family & Youth Services with the Central Program Office, bringing the working staff of St. MAM together in one location. Savings in rent and utilities at the former Chenoweth office will go back into direct program services, according to executive director Dan G. Lane.

St. MAM's plans include a weeklong open house during which citizens will be welcome to visit and tour the new offices. In addition, plans tentatively include a dedicatory service, a minister's brunch and a round-table discussion. Watch The Voice-Tribune

Good Neighboring

Trim those bushes: We at City Hall have had a number of calls lately about trees and bushes protruding into sidewalks. It's the responsibility of the homeowners to see that the walks are kept clear. Get out your trimmers.
