# Ad valorem tax discount raised to 44%

To offset extra costs incurred by the increase in property taxes this fall, St. Matthews City Council has voted to increase the discount offered on the ad valorem tax to 44%. All residents who pay their taxes before Oct. 31 will receive this discount.

For those unfamiliar with the ad valorem tax, it is a property tax collected by all cities from owners of property within city limits based on the assessed value of the property. Earlier this year, homes in St. Matthews and adjoining areas had their property values reassessed by the Jefferson County **Property Valuation Department for** the first time since 2007. The Jefferson County PVA is a Kentucky state constitutional office whose job is to assess property at its real value. PVA staff members met with St. Matthews residents at the St. Matthews Eline Library in April and May to answer questions concerning their taxes.

The City of St. Matthews does not have its own assessment department. In order to calculate the correct taxes owed, the City purchased the assessment data from the Jefferson County Property Valuation Assessment Department at a cost of \$50,000. After evaluating the PVA data, the City was concerned that those residents who pay their tax bills through an escrow account would most likely have to add more out of pocket this year, as the escrow account would not have reserved enough funds to pay this year's tax bills. "St. Matthews residents live in one of the most desirable communities in Jefferson County," said Mayor Rick Tonini. "The new PVA assessments are reflective of

that popularity and have caused an unexpected tax for many residents. Though the City of St. Matthews had no control over the unexpected tax debt, we felt that we should do what we could to

lessen the tax burden for our residents."

The ad valorem tax rate will remain at 20 cents per 100 and is due by the end of the year. However, for residents electing to pay their taxes by Oct. 31, the City's Mayor and Council voted to increase the ad valorem tax discount from 40% to 44%. The City hopes the additional tax discount will help offset some of the out of pocket expense that residents will have this year. Mayor Tonini continued, "The City Council and I are sensitive to decisions that affect our citizens and do our best to assist and support them. We want to continue to be good stewards of City funds while maintaining the great services that makes St. Matthews one of Louisville's most sought after

communities."

2017 tree planting Now is the

time to get on the spring 2017 tree

planting list. St. Matthews will plant free trees in rights-of-way for residents who call City Hall and request to be added to the list. Depending on the weather, Public Works will begin planting after the ground remains thawed in the spring. Tree planting not only beautifies the City but contributes to the overall effort to support the tree canopy.

In some situations, a request may not be filled. Examples of situations where planting may not be possible include the presence of underground utilities or overhead lines, proximity to drainage catch basins, and potential visual obstruction at an intersection. #### Using wood fireplaces

More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves, and other fuel-fired appliances as primary heat sources in their homes. The U.S. Fire Administration encourages you to practice the following fire safety steps to keep those home fires safely burning:

- Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually
- Clear the area around the hearth of debris
- Leave glass doors open while burning a fire to ensure complete combustion
- Close glass doors when the fire is out to keep air from the chimney opening from getting into the room
- Use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces that do not have a glass fireplace door
- Use fire-resistant materials on walls around wood stoves

- Never use flammable liquids to start a fire or leave a fire in the fireplace unattended
- Allow ashes to cool before disposing of them and saturate them with water
- Stack firewood outdoors at least 30 feet away from your home
- Keep the roof clear of leaves, pine needles, and other debris
- Cover the chimney with a mesh screen spark arrester
- Install smoke alarms, test them monthly, and change the batteries at least once a year

#### **Christmas tree disposal**

To dispose of your Christmas tree, set it by the street on your regularly scheduled trash day.



Recycling is collected every other week on the same day as trash on weeks highlighted in red. Holidays are marked in blue and will delay recycling and trash one day.

#### New vests inserts

St. Matthews Police

Department has purchased new bulletproof vest inserts that can withstand a



rifle bullet. Former bulletproof chest plates were designed to handle the force of handgun ammunition. The new chest plates are slightly heavier in weight, but still manageable for officers to wear comfortably.

The expense of the new chest plates was paid for with Forfeiture Funds, which are monies awarded to SMPD from drug arrests and seizures after convictions.

#### Narcan, lockout kits

Since being equipped with Narcan kits, between June 1 and Sept. 13 alone St. Matthews officers have successfully administered over 20 doses to approximately 10 individuals who were then transported to area hospitals. Narcan is a life-

watch out for all types of criminal activity and promote neighborhood security.



Community crime watches can address all types of crime, but their primary focus is typically

residential burglary and other crimes around the home, such as larceny and vandalism. Their presence can also help deter criminals who would attempt saving drug used to help reverse the effects of opioid or heroin overdoses. Because police are typically first responders at the scene of an overdose, SMPD Police Chief Norm Mayer suggested that each of the three patrol beats in St. Matthews have an officer equipped with a Narcan kit.

Besides the Narcan kits, SMPD has purchased lockout kits to assist in the rescue of children locked in hot vehicles. A few minutes can make the difference in life and death in this kind of emergency.

"good deals" as well! When possible, place valuables in your car out of sight or in your trunk when in parking lots or even your home driveways. Park close to the entrance and under lighting when possible and always lock your vehicle.

Don't leave your car running when you are not in it. It's not only a theft hazard, it's illegal.

After purchasing that new big-screen TV or other expensive item, remember to place the boxes in a trash receptacle and not on the curb. Criminals have been known to cruise neighborhoods looking to see what you have placed out for trash as a way to judge your residence as a potential target.

Don't pile presents under your Christmas tree in front of a window. This only serves as an invitation to burglars to break in. As always, if you see something suspicious, call immediately to report it. The St. Matthews Police Department is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and, no, you are not bothering them.

# Report unauthorized Solicitors to SMPD

Per City of St. Matthews ordinance 14-09, every person desiring to engage in soliciting in the City of St. Matthews, is required to obtain a City Certificate of Registration. The certificate should be carried by the solicitor, and both this certificate and the County Clerk/Metro certificate should be displayed upon request.

The ordinance also specifies that it is unlawful, whether a registered solicitor or not, to solicit before 9 a.m. or after 7 p.m. on weekdays and Saturdays and any time on Sunday or on a state or national holiday.

# **Code Words**

#### Vehicle parking

The Code Enforcement Department has received multiple complaints regarding the number and placement of vehicles parked at residences.

As a general rule, no more than four passenger vehicles may be parked at a residential lot, including in the driveway and on the right-of-way along the street in front of the residence. Any vehicle that is not a passenger vehicle may not be parked at a residence. Any truck or similar vehicle with dual rear wheels is not allowed at residential property.


No vehicle may be parked in the front yard of a residence at any time. If a vehicle is parked along the right-of-way, there are certain rules that must be followed:

- Vehicle must be parked heading in same direction as traffic flow on the same side
- Vehicle may not be parked so as to create an impassable obstruction of roadway
- Vehicle must be at least 30 feet from any stop sign or corner on either side of street

#### Sidewalk impairment

Another significant issue is the impairment of public sidewalks. In addition to vehicles being parked completely across a sidewalk, all too often a vehicle is parked so that the bumper or other extension of the vehicle partially blocks a sidewalk. The entire width of the sidewalk must be kept clear and free from obstruction.

The Americans with Disabilities Act requires the City to make every effort to ensure sidewalks are not obstructed. Please be a good and considerate citizen and do not create a problem for others using City sidewalks.



### Library expansion plans take shape

As planning for the expansion of the St. Matthews Eline Library continues, some details regarding the additional 11,300 square feet of space are emerging.

The Children's area will be enlarged and a Read to Me



Room will be added as well as an outdoor Children's Garden. Additional seating and reading areas for the adult section are built into the plan as are two enclosed study areas and large and small conference rooms. A new geothermal HVAC sys-

> tem will ensure the comfort of patrons in any season.

The City Hall campus will likewise be revitalized with separated designated parking lots and entrances for the library, police station, and City Hall. There will be landscape improvements throughout the campus. Green technology is incorporated into the landscape plan via pervious pavers. Pervious pavers serve the same purpose as pavement, but because there is a bed of small stones beneath them and between them, water can soak through where it can be filtered back into the soil.

Current library plans are being finalized to form a cost estimate. After the planning phase, the project will be put out to construction companies for bids. The goal is to begin work the first quarter of 2017.



#### **Catch basins**

Keep catch basins clear of leaves and debris to prevent flooding.

#### Appliance and junk pick up

#### Get ready for snow

When it snows, remove cars or other obstructions from the streets so that Works Department snowplows can get through.

After heavy snowfalls and when sidewalks are icy, garbage cans must be carried to the street. Be a good neighbor and clear snowy sidewalks.

#### **Street lights**

When clocks turn back Sunday, Nov. 6, residents will want to double their efforts to watch for children

walking to school or waiting for

the bus in the dark. Working street lights are especially important for the safety of children. To report an out of service street light or one that burns all day, telephone 638-4STM (4786) and select option 2, then option 4.

#### **Tree maintenance**

Tree maintenance is the homeowner's responsibility. Call Daryl Cleary, City arborist at 899-2544 for advice on proper trimming. No tree in the City's right-of-way should be removed without prior approval from the City.

## Leaf collection just around the corner

Leaf collection begins the last full week of October or the first week in November, depending on leaf fall.

To participate in the leaf pick up program, leaves should be raked to the edge of the front of the property but not



into the street. Crews will remove leaves along the street, utilizing a vacuum system. Each area is

> scheduled to be covered only once; however, should time and weather permit, a possible second sweep may occur.

If you have placed your leaves at the street edge of your property and have been missed by our crews, please contact City Hall at 895-9444.

Leaves can also be disposed of at the time of your regularly scheduled garbage pick-up. Leaves must be placed in trash containers marked "Yard Waste" or in biodegradable yard bags. Free "Yard Waste" stickers for your trash containers can be pick up at St. Matthews City Hall.

## **Hot Off the Press**

#### Ambulances purchased for fire district protection

Two ambulances, stretchers, and medical supplies have been ordered to begin serving the St. Matthews Fire Protection District this fall.

Last year, Fire Chief William J. Seng saw the need for an ambulance service to better serve the residents of the St. Matthews and surrounding areas and asked the fire district's Board of Trustees to allow him to investigate the possibility. As a result, the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Holding Company applied to the State of Kentucky for a Certificate of Need to operate two ambulances.

The current operational model calls for one ambulance to be assigned to each of the district's two fire stations. The CSX railroad tracks divide the district in half with Station #1 located at 240 Sears Avenue and Station #2 located at 4400 Brownsboro Road.

The Fire Protection District protects 10 small cities: Beechwood Village, Bellwood, Brownsboro Village, Druid Hills, Indian Hills, Maryhill Estates, Norbourne Estates, Rolling Fields, St. Matthews, Windy Hills, and Woodlawn Park. Each of the small cities was supportive of the new ambulances during the hearing process in Frankfort.

The ambulances will be placed in service as soon as personnel are hired and the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Service completes a new service inspection.

# Fire station receives overhaul

If you have driven by the intersection of Brownsboro Road and Hubbard's Lane you may have noticed that St. Matthews Fire Station #2 looks



a little different. The fire district is in the middle of a major remodeling project at the 27 year old station. Built in 1989 to better serve homes and businesses north of the railroad tracks, the station housed only volunteer firemen until 2000 when the station was staffed with a 24/7 career crew of four firefighter EMTs.

In 2015 the station hired Luckett & Farley Architects, Engineers & Construction Managers, Inc. to review the current layout and needs of the building. A plan was submitted to the fire district trustees for their approval.

The project includes working primarily on both sides of the station apparatus bays. The current living spaces on the quarry side of the building will be remodeled to include a new restroom and kitchen, as well

as updated bedrooms. An addition to the Brownsboro Road side will incorporate a new office, exercise room, and laundry facility.

David Construction was awarded the bid to perform the renovation work, which is scheduled to be completed early in 2017.
