

City servants mourned; McKiernan elected to council

When City Council member Martha Schade passed away unexpectedly in February, the mayor and other council members faced the difficult task of finding the right person to fill the position while mourning the loss of their friend and colleague.

In her 33 years of continuous service on the City of St. Matthews Council, Martha served on the Insurance Committee and the Personnel Committee, and chaired



the Buildings Committee, among other duties. Her latest visible project was the supervision of the repainting of City Hall.

"Martha was devoted to the citizens of St. Matthews, residents and citizens alike," said City Clerk Susan Clark. "With each vote she cast, she only had their best interest at heart."

Martha was a vested member of The Chamber of St. Matthews, and the co-owner/operator of Tony's Wrecker Service with her husband, Jerry. She was a charter member of the Women's Towing & Recovery Association of America. "Martha was deeply involved in the Chamber, and she had a vision for creating an environment in which businesses could grow," said Mayor Rick Tonini. "We grieve her passing along with Jerry, their two sons, Lee and Nick, and their three grandchildren."

Rather than just appoint someone to fill Martha's position, the Mayor appointed a search committee to find a replacement. "We decided to advertise the position and go through an interview process," said City Councilman Tony Weiter, who served on the search committee with Tim Holland, Frank Flynn, and Bernie Bowling, Jr.

With only a 30-day window before the appointment privilege would be passed to the governor, the committee decided to advertise the position for a week

February 17. Besides her tax duties, Ann handled reservations for the Community Center and was the point person for many other duties such as filling the postage and drink machines, printing time cards, and organizing bank deposits.

City Clerk Susan Clark remembered Ann as the most observant person that she had ever been around. "She was a great researcher, had a fantastic memory, knew everything about property taxes, and had more institutional knowledge about City policies and practices than anyone," said Clark. "She was very funny, loved music, and loved her daughter more than anything. Her presence is missed."

A Message From...



Construction bids taken in March for the St. Matthews City Hall and Eline Library renovation and addition project were rejected by the City Council as too high. In response to the March bid opening, two bids were received, and both exceeded the design team's construction cost estimates.

The design team is in the process of hiring a construction management firm for the project and will rebid all work to achieve significant cost savings over the March bids. Construction is slated to begin this summer.

City develops new policies on public works

In February, the City Council adopted a revision to the ordinance relating to streets and sidewalks. The ordinance lists the requirements for encroachment permits and licenses, references standards for work in rights-of-way, and designates responsibility for the maintenance of sidewalks.

The City is also developing a Public Works and Assets Policy that will determine the types of permits required and the policies that will govern pulloffs, speed humps, and utility work.

City limits to keep the gutters free of debris and litter. Debris from open dumpsters and garbage cans and roadway litter can create an environmental hazard by making its way into the storm sewer system or creeks.

Most of the litter found along roadways are plastic bottles and food containers tossed from car windows. Please be courteous to others and safeguard the

Free services for stray cats

Feeding stray cats? Alley Cat

Advocates can help get outdoor cats fixed and vaccinated at no cost to you.



As part of Alley Cat Advocate's Trap-Neuter-Return program, the cat will be vaccinated, spayed or neutered, treated with flea and ear mite medicine, examined by a vet, and ear-tipped (the universal symbol of a neutered cat).

Time to mow

So you are glad winter is over but you haven't quite yet embraced the lawn duties that come with warmer weather. St. Matthews Ordinance § 94.04 requires that grass be maintained at a height no greater than 8 inches and that weeds and grass be properly maintained. This applies to private property as well as to adjacent public easements and rights-of-way. Therefore, besides your front lawn, it is also your responsibility to cut the grass and trim back weeds and grass in rear or side easements and alleyways.

Dispose of junk properly

Don't amass junk at the street. If you have a water heater or appliance to dispose of, call Rumpke to arrange its disposal. Remember that mattresses must be wrapped in plastic for disposal.

Trim shrubbery along roadsides

Ever come to an intersection and have to nose your vehicle out to see around bushes lining a property? It's important to trim your shrubbery or plants so that they do not obstruct a driver's view of traffic.

Leash law reminder

St. Matthews Ordinance § 88.03 states that pet owners must keep their cats, dogs, and other animals on a leash when not on the resident's property. If the animal is in an unfenced area on the owner's property, it must be under the control of the owner at all times.

Please Don't Feed Waterfowl

The next time you visit Brown Park or Draut Park with your little ones, leave the bread at home. Though it may be fun to feed the ducks and geese that inhabit Beargrass Creek, the practice can create many problems for the birds as well as for the environment.

As the nation's premier bird authority, the Audubon Society has debunked the notion that waterfowl cannot survive without human intervention. Ducks and geese have survived for thousands of years without handouts, and, today, many species of waterfowl are thriving. In fact, many urban parks like those in St. Matthews are now over-populated with ducks and geese. Please enjoy our local waterfowl, but view them from a distance and respect their wildness. By doing so, you will provide them with their best chance for survival and teach your little ones how to coexist with their feathered friends.



Reasons Not to Feed Waterfowl

- Causes overpopulation at small urban and suburban parks
- Causes severe habitat degradation
- Waterfowl lose their natural fear of humans
- Creates dietary and nutritional problems for the birds
- Causes disease within waterfowl populations

Completed Projects

•Snow and Ice Removal: The City of St. Matthews operates a comprehensive snow removal program. During small snow events, the work crews only salted intersections in an effort to be fiscally responsible. Major roads like Shelbyville, Westport, Hubbards, Browns, Bowling, and Breckenridge are the responsibility of Metro and the State.

- Improved spot drainage on Wiltshire and Iola
- Removed larger ash trees that were not able to be saved in Community and Brown Parks
- Replaced street signs in the Springhill area

Current Projects

- •Working with MSD to finalize plans on a drainage project between Kentucky and Washburn, with construction anticipated this summer
- Removing damaged ash trees on Bowling Boulevard and replacing them with red buds and dogwoods

- Cleaning up the landscaped areas, mulching, and planting approximately 50 trees throughout the 3 major parks
- Improving roadway on
 Stonehenge
- Replacing street signs in the Willis Avenue area
- Annual City-wide tree planting within the rights-of-way

Future Projects

- Improve spot drainage on Winchester, Hycliffe, and Breckenridge
- Replace street signs in the Cherrywood area
- Possible road widening of Primrose from Dellridge to Westport Road


Spring Cleanup for Fire Safety

Spring has arrived, and St. Matthews Fire & Rescue wants you to know that the timetested ritual of spring cleaning will help keep your homes safe from the threat of fire. Make your spring cleaning fire-safe by following these tips:

- Rid your garage of stored newspapers or other rubbish that can fuel a fire.
- Test smoke alarms monthly and replace every 10 years or as recommended by the manufacturer. Don't borrow smoke alarm batteries to use for toys or other equipment.

•To help prevent nuisance alarms, gently vacuum smoke alarms every six months or as needed.

- Change batteries in smoke alarms, flashlights, and carbon monoxide detectors.
 Keep outdoor debris or dead vegetation away from the house.
- Properly dispose of oily or greasy rags. If these items must be stored, they should be kept in labeled, sealed, metal containers.
- If you store gasoline, keep it outside your home in a shed



or detached garage. Keep only small quantities in tightly sealed containers. Use gasoline only as a motor fuel – never as a cleaning agent.

- Use outdoor barbecue grills with caution. Place in a safe area away from buildings, windows, heating, ventilation, and air conditioning units or places with high or dead vegetation.
- Never use gasoline to start the fire, and don't add charcoal lighter fluid once the fire has started.
- Use barbecue grills outside only – not under overhangs or balconies, and away from combustibles.
- Check your propane grill hose for leaks and cracks; never store propane indoors.

both on the City website and through the Reach Alert system. The committee received 26 resumes and interviewed six of the applicants.

Recommendations were made to the Mayor and City Council, who voted unanimously to appoint Shaun McKiernan as the eighth councilman. His term of office runs until December of 2018.

McKiernan was a political science major at Notre Dame University and taught middle school in Mississippi after college. He has worked in a budgetary role for the Commonwealth for the last seven years, first serving as a budget policy analyst and fiscal manager at the Kentucky Department of Veteran Affairs.

Currently, McKiernan serves on the Council for Post-Secondary Education, working on the agency budget and coordinating budget needs for all Kentucky universities and the Kentucky Community & Technical College System. "One of

the things we do is set tuition at public universities," he said.

Normally, McKiernan's government job would prohibit him from taking public office, but a nonpartisan position such as city councilman is not off limits. "My wife knew I wanted to serve, and saw the position advertised through Reach Alert," he said. "It was perfect. My wife and I love living in St. Matthews so much that rather than move when our family grew, we decided to add on."

McKiernan has been married for 8 years and has a 4-year-old and a 14-month-old. He sings at church and is a member and past president of the Louisville Division of the Hibernians. "We enjoy putting on the St. Patrick's Day parade and are involved in all things Irish," he said.

He continued, "I think my role as a council member is to keep St. Matthews the very special place it is. I look forward to meeting more constituents and being at public events, and I would love to hear from people if they have questions or concerns. I am both humbled and honored to be a part of the City Council."
