# Clark earns Master Municipal Clerk designation

City Clerk Susan Clark recently became the first clerk in the history of the City of St. Matthews to earn a professional certification as a Master Municipal Clerk. The degree requires 90 hours of education as well as professional development and community services hours.

Mayor Rick Tonini said he feels very lucky to have Clark as City Clerk. He continued, "I have been an elected official in the City of St. Matthews for almost 34 vears. I've worked with several City Clerks over that time, and they have all been great. Susan is the only one who accepted the challenge from Mayor Bernie Bowling to take her time and educate herself through the Kentucky League of Cities (KLC) clerks program. She makes it easy for the mayor and council to govern."

As City Clerk, Clark is the City's official record keeper.

At City Council meetings, she is responsible for taking the meeting minutes and performing roll call.

She is responsible for maintaining City documents and ensuring that

they are organized in a way to be

easily retrievable.

Clark is also City Treasurer and, as such, pays all invoices, keeps track of numerous bank accounts, and works with auditors. "I am proud that St. Matthews has a record of clean audits," she said. "I've continued to use a checks and balance system that has ensured

there have been no illegal findings in the history of the City of St. Matthews."

Clark received her Municipal Clerk designation from the KLC in 2016 and her Master Municipal Clerk certificate this past summer. "I felt like earning this certificate would enable me to better serve the mayor, City Council, and the residents of St. Matthews," said Clark, explaining that the classes include everything from the proper way to follow *Roberts Rules of Order* to the requirements for handling special funding or holding public hearings.

In addition to earning the Master Municipal Clerk certificate, Clark achieved the KLC's Level II: Excellence in City Governance in September. The level requires 60 hours of KLC conference training.

To keep abreast of current events, Clark attends Jefferson County League of Cities meetings, meetings typically attended only by mayors and city council members. "When we hold our council meetings, I know what's on the horizon and if someone has a question, I usually know the answer," she said.

Clark is also the current chair of the KIPDA Municipal Clerks Association. Kentuckiana Regional Planning and Development Agency, or KIPDA, provides regional planning for public administration, social services, and transportation for interactive counties in Kentucky and Indiana. City Council meetings have been temporarily moved to the St. Matthews Community





### **Major Jones replaces** Major Beyer; Officer Roy hired

Major Dave Beyer, Support Bureau Commander, resigned from the St. Matthews Police Department to further his legal career with the law practice of Pence & Ogburn, PLLC. Major Beyer served as Legal Advisor and both Assistant and Interim Chief until Chief Wilkerson was hired as the new Chief of Police. SMPD thanks him for his dedicated service.

Major Eddie Jones was hired in September to assume the Support Bureau Commander's position left vacant by Major Beyer. Major Jones, a former Jefferson County and Louisville Metro police officer, has served in law enforcement for over 30 years. He has an extensive background in the areas of patrol, criminal

investigations, and special investigations, including narcotics and internal affairs. He retired from the Louisville Metro Police

Department (LMPD) as the commander of the 5th Division, Narcotics Division, and the Special Investigations Division, which handled criminal and procedural complaints against police officers and government employees. He sworn in as SMPD's has a Bachelor's Degree in Police Administration and has attended the Southern Police Institutes Administrative Officers Course and The FBI National Academy.

Officer Kevin Roy also was hired in September. Office Roy began his law enforcement career in 2008 with the City of Shepherdsville as a patrol officer. In 2012, he joined the LMPD, where he was assigned as a patrol officer in the 8th and 6th divisions. In 2016, he was transferred to the training unit, where he served as a firearms instructor for the department. While with LMPD, he was also a member of the Special Response Team.

Officer Roy graduated from Trinity High School in 1995 and has a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Management from Indiana Wesleyan University. He has also earned Associate degrees in both Criminal Justice and Human Resources from the Community College of the Air Force. Officer Roy is a Senior Master Sergeant in the Kentucky Air National Guard, where he serves as the Security Forces Logistics

### Citizen contact process

The SMPD has established a Citizen Contact Tracking system to document reports to the department made by residents of, and visitors to, St. Matthews. Born of a desire to foster more connection with, and accountability to, citizens, the system documents reports such as complaints or compliments about officers, speeding complaints in neighborhoods, narcotics activity, other suspicious activity, and any additional issues relating to the community.

The SMPD encourages community members to contact them through the City website, email, phone, walk-ins, or by using the anonymous crime tip line at 498-CLUE (2583). The appropriate Division Commander will assign an officer to follow up on the tip or contact, and activities by SMPD officers will be documented.

### **Crime Buzz**

### **Avoid fundraising scams**

Police risk their lives to make your community safer. To show your support, you may wish to make a donation when you are called by someone who is raising funds in the name of local police unions. Before you make a donation you should consider the following:

- Just because the name police or Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) is in the name of the organization does not mean that police are members of the group.
- Just because the organization says it has ties to a local police organization does not mean your contribution will be used locally or for public safety.
- Most solicitors that call you asking for donations are paid professional fundraisers.
   If you wish to donate to the

local FOP or any charity, go the

website of the organization and call the number listed. You can also check sites like Charity navigator.org and then, if it checks out, make your donation. The bottom line is never give money over the phone to any charity until you know exactly how your contribution will be used. Don't be afraid to ask questions. The local FOP organizations will never call you or pressure you to make a donation on the spot. Anyone with questions about the legitimacy of a fundraiser is encouraged to call the FOP directly.

Other scam artists may ask you to go get a money card or to send money through Western Union. Legitimate organizations, including the local police, sheriff offices, or the FBI will never ask you to do this. Scammers request

money cards and money orders because they are hard to track.

# Anti-theft shopping practices

The SMPD suggests you follow these guidelines to reduce the chance of being a victim of a crime while shopping:

- Park in well-lit areas
- Lock your vehicle
- Minimize the number of valuables you leave in your vehicle
- Lock your purse and other valuables in the trunk
- Keep your cell phone on your person
- Do not leave your purse or wallet sitting in a



- shopping cart unattended
- Don't carry large amounts of cash

### **Park Place**

New stadium being built



The City of St. Matthews, in collaboration with the Trinity High School Foundation, is building a modern high school sports stadium on the current Voll Field location at Community Park.

Trinity High School Foundation will be responsible for the con-

struction of the stadium, which will be used by both St. Matthews Little League and Trinity High School. Trinity has signed a long term lease and usage agreement, which stipulates it will pay a yearly rental fee of \$10,000 and a yearly maintenance fee of \$3,000 to the City. The stadium is expected to be ready for use by spring 2019.

### Please don't feed wildlife

As deer and other wildlife enter neighborhoods, it is important to remember not to feed them. Feeding non-threatening wildlife can invite predators, such as coyotes, into the neighborhood, which can endanger both pets and humans. Coyotes have been spotted in many areas of our City.

Feeding wildlife can expose humans and pets to harmful diseases. It can also disrupt the natural diet of wildlife, causing animal health issues.



### **Code Words**

If you have called the City of St. Matthews because your neighbor's yard seems more like Daniel Boone's wilderness, you may be confident that steps are being taken to tame the offending flora. But be patient—the circumstances surrounding the cause of the offense may require some time to resolve.

Complaints about residential properties needing attention typically fall into three categories: unkempt grounds, dilapidated structures, and abandoned vehicles.

#### Grounds

When a complaint is made regarding grass that is too high or rubbish that is piling up around a residence, the City of St. Matthews sometimes finds during its investigation that the residence is occupied by an elderly person or a resident who has lost his job and must make spending choices due to a shrinking budget. In these situations, the City tries to connect the residents with groups or organizations that may be in a position to assist them.

In some cases, the residence is a rental property and neither the occupants nor the landlord keep it up. Following proper legal procedure, the City first gives these residents notice to clean up or mow their grounds. Failure to comply after a reasonable amount of time will result in the issuance of a citation and a further warning to correct the situation. In extreme cases, the

City may cut the grass or clean up the rubbish and file a lien against the property to recover expenditures, but proper notice must be given.

#### **Structures**

There is no City of St. Matthews ordinance regarding structural maintenance; however, the Louisville Metro property maintenance ordinance is applicable in St. Matthews. A complaint can be made through the MetroCall system by dialing 311 and providing the address of the property along with a description of the issue.

### **Vehicles**

Sometimes a complaint is made regarding an abandoned vehicle. While an abandoned vehicle on the public right-of-way can be towed, such a vehicle on private property is not so easily removed. Just as no one can remove something from your property without following proper legal procedures, so, too,

must the City take the proper steps before it can remove an abandoned vehicle from private property.

The most difficult situations to resolve are those where the owner has lost the property to a lending institution or other entity. Often the owner is nowhere to be found, and the institution does not take ownership of the property. Some institutions are more cooperative than others, but the City works diligently to see that action is taken for the good of the neighborhood.

Following proper legal steps to resolve complaints regarding grounds, structures, or abandoned vehicles does take time. There are no short cuts to justice. But, rest assured, the City is at work finding a solution to the problem.

### Fire Hydrants 101

One of the first challenges firefighters face when arriving at a fire is finding enough water to put it out. Common sense tells us a car on fire will require much less water than a burning apartment building. Firefighters use a formula to calculate gallons of water needed.

In most urban and suburban areas, water is piped to a neighborhood from a distant source such as a reservoir or lake and is maintained by the local water district. Though most of this water is used by residents for drinking, bathing, and the like, water districts are also required

to allow firefighters to access the water through fire hydrants.

Because of differences in water systems, the number of gallons that can be pumped per minute from fire hydrants varies. To quickly find a fire hydrant with the correct number of gallons



necessary to fight the fire, firefighters depend upon a color coding system set up by the National Fire Protection

Agency. In this system, fire hydrants using public water supply systems are painted yellow while the color of their tops and caps indicate the available gallons per minute (GPM). The colors are as follows: red—500 GPM; orange—500-999 GPM; green—1,000-1,499 GPM; and blue—1,500 GPM or more.

If a hydrant accesses a private system, such as a well in a neighborhood, the hydrant is painted red to distinguish it from a publicly supplied system.

# **Good Neighboring**

### **Street lights**

As it gets darker earlier, remember to report out of service street lights by dialing the Call St. Matthews line at 638-4STM (4786) and selecting option 2, then option 4.

### Keep sidewalks clear

All residents are reminded to prevent possible slips and falls by keeping their sidewalks clear of leaves and snow.

### Pet clean-up

While on your fall walks, remember to pick up after your pets and keep them on a leash.

### **Garbage containers**

Garbage cans and recycling containers should not be set out until 5 p.m. the day before pickup, and containers should be put away the same day they are emptied.

Ensure all garbage cans have lids. During snow events or when sidewalks are icy, garbage cans should be set out at the street.

### Holiday gift boxes

Place your holiday gift boxes in your recycling container.
Leaving boxes out may alert thieves that you have something worth stealing.



# **Hometown History - 2018**

#### **THEN**

The photo of Landohr's Bowling Alley on page 2 was taken around 1945. According to Jefferson County Historic Preservation and Archives, when Bill Dohrman opened the bowling alley in 1941, it was surrounded by potato fields, but the city rapidly grew out to meet it. Landohr's remained a popular spot until 1959 when the larger and more modern Ten Pin Lanes opened a short distance down Shelbyville Road, forcing it to close in 1965.

### NOW

The plot of ground where the bowling alley sat is now occupied by the rear of the Mini Cooper dealership located at 4170 Shelbyville Road.
