Firefighting family recalls SMFD's 100 years



St. Matthews has had fire service since 1919 and for 88 of its 100 years, the Monohan

family has had men serving in the department.

The first fire service in St. Matthews was a brigade formed in 1919 under the name St. Matthews Voluntary Fire Association. During its early years, the Association purchased a hand-pulled hose cart and then a Model T Ford truck on which were mounted chemical tanks. But by 1930, with the Great

Depression starting, the Association and the St. Matthews Community Club that sponsored it were falling on hard times with little money and few volunteers. A push to solicit money from the community and businesses allowed the Association to pay off their new fire engine, dubbed Betsy, and slowly began to grow. In 1937, John M. Monohan, Jr. joined his brother, Henry, who was

serving as a volunteer. Four years later, he was appointed Fire Chief, serving for 36 years, from 1941 to 1977.

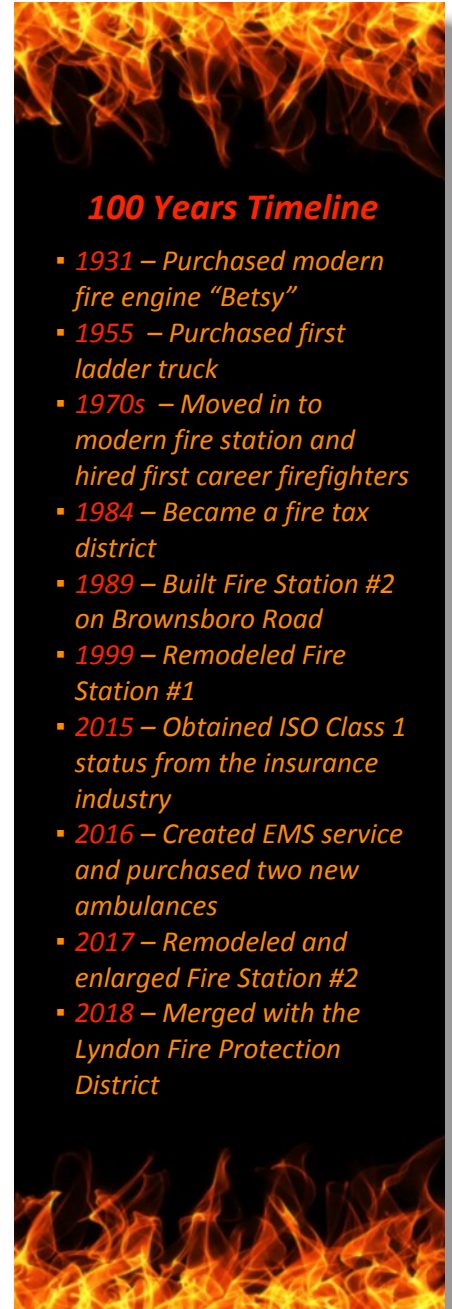
"I remember when my Dad first became Chief in 1941, I was just four years old and followed him around everywhere, said Jack Monohan, who started volunteering with the department in 1951 and served as Assistant Fire Chief for 20 years. "I can vividly remember seeing a new

fire engine being delivered to the Ford dealership, where it was housed. The key hung in the showroom." Later, Jack bought that same engine and refurbished it.

Under Chief Monohan, what was now called the St. Matthews Fire Department moved several times from modest fire stations and three new fire houses were constructed. Chief Monohan also added new fire engines, two-way radios, and the first self-contained breathing apparatus in the state. "Earlier, breathing apparatus weren't as important as most smoke was from

100 Years Timeline

- 1955 – Purchased first ladder truck
- 1970s – Moved in to modern fire station and hired first career firefighters
- 1984 – Became a fire tax district
- 1989 – Built Fire Station #2 on Brownsboro Road
- 1999 – Remodeled Fire Station #1
- 2015 – Obtained ISO Class 1 status from the insurance industry
- 2016 – Created EMS service and purchased two new ambulances
- 2017 – Remodeled and enlarged Fire Station #2
- 2018 – Merged with the Lyndon Fire Protection District

Recycling Yard Waste and Trash

Yard waste, including leaves and

grass clippings, will be picked up on the same day as your scheduled sanitation collection. Yard waste must be placed at the street in either containers holding a maximum of 30 gallons and marked "yard waste only," paper yard waste bags, or compostable plastic bags that meet ASTM D6400 standards. There is no alley pickup.

Please note that designated yard waste must not contain any trash

or garbage if it is to be collected for recycling. The City of St. Matthews offers free stickers to designate containers for yard waste. Visit City Hall during normal business hours to pick up your stickers.

Curbside recycling cannot take plastic bags and bubble wrap, though you can recycle these at Kroger. The following items can be recycled at curbside:

- Soft plastic household bottles, jars or other plastic containers such as liter soda bottles, salad dressing bottles, milk/water jugs or laundry/cleaning product containers.
- Any color glass bottles and jars.

- All metals such as tin food cans, aluminum and steel beverage cans, aluminum foil and pie pans, and empty aerosol spray cans.
- All paper and cardboard from items such as newspapers, drink boxes, milk and juice cartons, food boxes, cereal boxes, junk mail or other papers, magazines, and corrugated cardboard.

Note: All food containers and aluminum should be rinsed free of food residue. Also, remove container lids and place in the trash. If possible, flatten items and remove labels.

Police Beat

National Night Out

National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that enhances the relationship between neighbors and law enforcement while bringing back a true sense of community. SMPD personnel will be present to assist with interactive displays and give information.

Also participating and presenting displays are St. Matthews Fire and EMS and the St. Matthews Public Works Department. Other neighborhood partners joining the event are Mission BBQ, Kroger, and Target, to name a few.

Along with the exhibits, there will be give-aways, prize drawings, and equipment on display. SMPD invites everyone out to meet your police officers and get to know your St. Matthews neighbors.

Fingerprinting Services

The St. Matthews Police Department offers fingerprinting services on Tuesdays and Thursdays from

9 a.m.–3 p.m. There is no appointment necessary. A fee of \$10 per card must be paid with check or cash. A valid photo ID (driver's license, state ID, passport, etc.) is required. The paper used for the printing is provided for you.

Prescription Drug Drop Off

Prescription drug drop off has resumed at the police station. Hours of operation are Monday–Friday, 8 a.m.–4 p.m. The drug drop off is for unwanted prescription pills only; over-the-counter medications are not accepted. All drugs MUST be in a sealed zip-lock bag when being deposited.

The following are not accepted: drugs in plastic containers (or in unopened boxes containing plastic containers), liquids, inhalers, and syringes with needles.

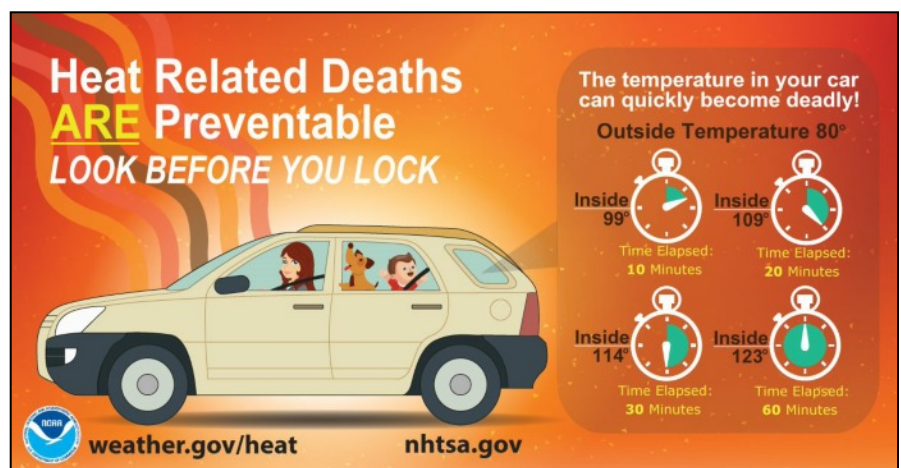
Preventing Heat-Related Deaths

According to KidsandCars.org, an average of 38 children a year die from heat-related deaths after being trapped

inside vehicles.

The inside of a vehicle heats up very quickly. Even with the windows cracked, the temperature inside a car can reach 125 degrees in minutes with 80% of the increase in temperature occurring in the first 10 minutes. *Cracking the windows does not help slow the heating process or decrease the maximum degrees.*

To prevent heat-related deaths, make a habit of opening the back car door after you park to ensure no one is left behind. Enforce the habit by placing an item you can't do without in the back seat (example laptop, handbag, etc.). Clearly communicate about who is getting each child out of the vehicle. Other preventive measures include keeping your vehicle locked when not in use and never leaving car keys within reach of children. You should also teach children to honk the horn when they are trapped inside a car.



Crime Buzz

Prevent Theft of Valuables

The St. Matthews Police Department reminds you to keep your cars locked when you are not in them. Take your valuables with you or lock them in the trunk.

Package Security

If you are concerned about package security, Amazon packages can be sent to a locker and held for pick up at Whole Foods (4944 Shelbyville Road) or Stein Mart (5055 Shelbyville Road). Amazon Lockers are

secure, self-service kiosks that allow you to pick up your package at a time that is convenient for you.



Safe Exchange Zone

The Internet Safe Exchange Zone is available on the City Hall campus outside the main entrance to the Police Department. The area is well-lit and under video surveillance at all times.

This zone allows those who make Internet-based purchases from websites such as Craigslist and Facebook a safe place to exchange goods. It can also be used as a safe place for child custody exchange.

Free house watch

SMPD performs free house watches for residents who are on vacation or away from home. Just telephone SMPD at 893-9000 to schedule or fill out the online form on the City website.

Playtime and family picnics in Brown Park have been greatly

Former councilman passes away



Harry Hargadon, Jr., a St. Matthews City Councilman for 26 years, passed away June

11. Harry served on the City Council from January 1974 to December 2000. Councilman Bernie Bowling, who served with Harry, said, "Harry was on the Council when I came and was a very good mentor. He always had

the best interest of the citizens and taxpayers at heart. Harry also chaired the Police Committee and was instrumental in making the Police Department what it is today."

Harry graduated from St. Xavier High School, Xavier University, and the University of Louisville School of Law. In 2006, he retired from the law firm of Hargadon, Hargadon, Lenihan and Harbolt,

which he formed in 1961. Besides his 13 terms as a St. Matthews councilman, Harry served as President of the Kentucky Academy of Trial Attorneys from 1972-1973 and served on their board of directors and as an advisor for many years.

Beloved by friends and family alike, Harry will be warmly remembered and sadly missed.

Code Words

Solicitation requires a certificate

Those who wish to ask businesses or residents to purchase something or to make donations must be registered with the City of St. Matthews.

To obtain a certificate of solicitation, the applicant must already hold a similar certificate from the Jefferson County Clerk or Metro Louisville. The applicant must furnish the City of St. Matthews with a copy of the



certificate along with a photo. There is a \$5 fee.

Those exempt from the certificate requirement include charitable or civic organizations, religious organizations, educational institutions, and student groups or parent-teacher organizations. Organizations wishing to solicit charitable donations along road intersections are not exempt from the certificate requirement.

These ordinances are meant

to protect St. Matthews residents. At any time, businesspersons or residents may ask to see a solicitor's registration certificate. No soliciting is allowed prior to 9 a.m. or after 7 p.m. any day of the week or at any time on Sunday or on a state or national holiday. "No Solicitation" signs are to be respected.

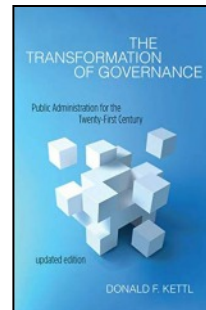

wood or cotton,” said Jack. “Later, with smoke from synthetics, that equipment was life-saving.”

Jack, his dad, and his uncle weren’t the only firefighters in the family. Jack’s brother, Doug, started volunteering in the department in 1964 and served until 1974, ending his time as a truck company Captain before his day job transferred him to Arkansas. “I went to high school at Trinity right across the street from the fire station,” said Doug. “I remember doing my homework at the station and helping out. I grew up in a fire fighting family, so I was ready to serve as a volunteer when I turned 21,” he said.

Jack said service was everything. “I remember that a bunch of us were hanging out in downtown St. Matthews with our dates, and when the call came, we left our dates right there and went. If we missed the chance to serve, we felt upset, like we were not pulling our load.”

Jack’s wife Marilyn remembers being in the car when Jack got calls on the radio. “The kids and I knew to be silent at that point because it was very important that communication not be interrupted,” she said. “I’d be cooking dinner, and the alarm would go off, and he would

leave immediately. We just went on and ate because it was a part of life. We made it work and have been married for 56 years.”

Gradually career firefighters were hired in St. Matthews by then Fire Chief Frank Florence to assist volunteers and maintain fire hydrants and

equipment. In 1984, the department transitioned from the original association to a fire protection district, which is a special taxing district governed by a board of trustees.

It was during this time of transition that both of Jack’s sons volunteered. Kent Monohan began serving in 1976 and became a career firefighter in 1987. He retired from service in 2013 holding the rank of Captain. “Believe it or not, it wasn’t family tradition that started me serving,” he said. “I was going into the Navy, and when my plans fell through, one of my best

friends, who was serving as a firefighter, suggested I join. I did, and I never looked back.”

Jack’s son, Stuart Monohan, who is a current St. Matthews City Councilman, began volunteering in 1981. He was hired as a career firefighter in 1984 and is now the Assistant Fire Chief. “I remember as a kid that it was very exciting to see my Grandfather and Dad run out of our house to go help others,” he said. “The training we did and the emergency calls we made together with other friends and firefighters was very fulfilling. The whole department was and still is a family, even if we are not all related.”

Helping others is exactly why Jack first volunteered. “You are helping people through their worst times, whether it be a fire, a car accident, or a heart attack,” he said. Reminiscing, he told the story of a man he pulled from a room fully ablaze only to learn he died later at the hospital. Domestic cases were particularly hard. “Once, a husband and wife were separated,” he said. “The husband set his wife’s house on fire, and when she moved, he set that house on fire, too. Both she and the children got out unharmed. It’s not always the

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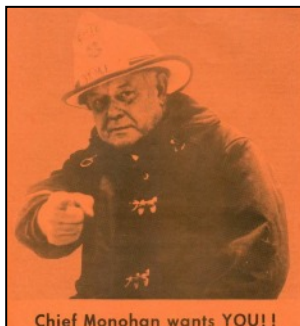
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fires that get the most press that are the toughest to deal with," he said.

This passion for helping in an emergency was passed down in the Monohan family as three more family members joined the department. A cousin, Justin Tamplin, whose mother is a Monohan, began volunteering in 1993

on his 18th birthday. He served with a rank of Firefighter 1 until 1998 when his career as a sound engineer took him to Colorado. He said his decision to volunteer was definitely influenced by the family tradition. Robbie Monohan, Kent's son, was in the Explorers from 2000–2002, a program akin to the Boy Scouts, where teenagers train with firefighters and learn about the profession. At 18, he joined the Air Force, where he holds the rank of E6 Technical Sergeant.

Robbie's brother, Michael, began volunteering in 2005 and was hired

as a career firefighter in 2007. After six years at St. Matthews, he moved to the Louisville Fire Department, where he currently holds the rank of Sergeant on Engine 6. "As a little kid I was surrounded by firefighters and loved looking at my Grandpa's firefighting collection," he said. "I used to hang out with my Dad when I was in high school, but I didn't pursue firefighting as a career right off. I wanted to be a chef. Then I spoke with a representative at Sullivan College and decided the hours chefs kept weren't for me." He laughed. "My Dad mentioned that a firefighting recruiting class was starting, so I joined. By the third class, I was hooked."

Since 1992, St. Matthews Fire Department has continued to

grow under the leadership of current Fire Chief William J. Seng. In 2015, the department attained an ISO Class 1 classification, the best rating in the country. In 2016, the fire district purchased two ambulances and hired paramedics and emergency medical technicians to provide primary EMS medical care for the area. In 2017, Fire Station #2 was enlarged and remodeled to accommodate the new ambulance and the addition of a fire engine. Most recently, in July of 2018, the St. Matthews and Lyndon fire districts merged, bringing together two great organizations.

Throughout most of its 100 years of change, the Monohan family has been a part of the St. Matthews firefighting family. When asked what he says to today's firefighters, Jack said that the key to the job is to give it your most. "It's the best job in the world," he said.
