



Meet St. Matthews Public Works Director Kenan Stratman



Kenan Stratman, public works director for the City of St. Matthews, has been with the city since 2015. Kenan's working relationship with the city goes back even further than that, as he worked on projects for fifteen years for the city of St. Matthews with his previous employer, a consulting firm, prior to coming on board with the city.

In 2015, Mayor Tonini approached Kenan about a position as public works director. Prior to Kenan, there had been a construction side and a maintenance side for the city, and this position merged them. One of the benefits of doing so was that it avoids duplication of services and allows for the allocation of manpower where it is needed—a better use of taxpayers' monies.

Mayor Tonini states, that, "We needed someone who could both talk to the public and solve problems. I put all of my trust in Kenan to represent me in situations where contractors are working for

us. Kenan probably thinks that what he does for the city is quite normal, but for me it puts him at the level of superstar status."

A graduate of the University of Kentucky with a degree in civil engineering, Kenan says one of the best parts of his job is, "When I can efficiently assist a resident with whatever problem they may have." Kenan is also assistant city engineer and part of his job as assistant city engineer involves working with residents on drainage issues, road repairs, and he takes calls on a daily basis on these matters. Jim Birch, a 30-year-employee, is city engineer, and Kenan steps in when needed.

Kenan, who is married with two children, has about fifteen employees that report to him and he is very thankful for his crew. Kenan says, "I'm fortunate to work with a group of guys who know their roles and responsibilities and take pride in doing their jobs." Kenan also works closely with Terry Ridgeway, St. Matthews public works supervisor for 35 years and they have a good rapport.

Kenan says, "Having the ability to work with experienced coworkers was a major factor in taking the job

with the City. It allows me to be the 'Curtain' with Terry Ridgeway and Jim Birch the 'OZ.' Between the two of them, they have over 60 years of experience with the City of St. Matthews. The city would not be what it is with out the two of them. Over the last five years, I have tried to be a sponge and soak in all the knowledge. On a daily basis, Terry and I meet to go over the various work orders. He is the man that puts that plan into action and makes sure they are done to St. Matthews expectations. He is truly 'Mr. St.

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A Message From...

RESCUE funds

The new federal administration has passed the new RESCUE plan, which is a direct response to the COVID-19 pandemic and its effect on the economy and employment. The RESCUE funds are distributed to states, who in turn distribute funds to cities and counties.

St. Matthews will be receiving funds over the next two years, according to Mayor Rick Tonini. The city had previously received \$1.4 million under the CARES ACT. Mayor Tonini says that the city is “great stewards of our taxpayers money. The funds will be used to replace lost revenue, drainage, assist small businesses and in other areas which benefit our residents.”

The RESCUE monies are to be used to:

- Support public health expenditures, by funding COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff;
- Address negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency, including economic harms to workers, households, small businesses, impacted industries, and the public sector;
- Replace lost public sector revenue, using this funding to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic;
- Provide premium pay for essential workers, offering additional support to those who have borne and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical infrastructure sectors; and,
- Invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure, making necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water; support vital wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and to expand access to broadband internet.

Waste Disposal 101

St. Matthews contracts with Rumpke for the collection of residential household solid waste, yard waste, recycling, and junk pickup. The guidelines are established by both St. Matthews Ordinance and the contract with Rumpke.

Section 50.01 (F) of St. Matthews Ordinances states, "It shall be unlawful to set out for curb-side collection, garbage, yard waste, recycling, large items, limbs, or junk more than 24 hours in advance of the normal collection date. Any carts, cans or containers must be moved back from the curb to the principal structure or garage within 24 hours after collection. Any garbage, yard waste, recycling, large items, limbs, junk, or anything else set out, but which was not collected, or refused for collection, must be removed from the curb and brought back to the residence within 24 hours of the pickup for which it was set out for collection."

Section 50.01 (B) and (C) also require all waste material (except

large items, limbs, and junk) to be in a container; and waste containers shall be kept covered at all times with a tight fitting lid. Plastic bags containing any household solid waste may not be placed anywhere outside a container with a tight fitting lid. Yard waste may be placed in marked yard waste containers OR biodegradable bags only – no plastic. Household solid waste and yard waste are collected once a week per the schedule established by Rumpke. Recycling is collected every other week at curb-side.

Under the contract with the City, Rumpke has established guidelines for yard waste and junk pickup.

Yard waste may be placed in containers, biodegradable bags, or bundled. However, the weight limit on any one container, bag, or bundle is 50 pounds. No more than 7 bags or bundles will be collected on any one collection day. Bundles of limbs, shrubbery, and tree trimmings must be tied, shall not be more

than 4 foot lengths with limbs not more than 5 inches in diameter, and placed at curbing or at an alley (for those with alley collection). Whole Christmas trees will be picked up at the curb or alley.

Rumpke will pick up a reasonable amount of additional household junk (including one appliance) with its normal collection, if placed at the street or alley where garbage is normally picked up. Rumpke may charge the occupant to pick up more than one discarded appliance per pick up and may refuse collection of an unreasonable amount of junk. Large items such as mattresses, furniture, and the like are treated the same as appliances, but must be wrapped in plastic. It is highly recommended that you call Rumpke (1-800-828-8171) 24 to 48 hours in advance of your normal collection day to arrange for these large item pick ups. Recycling is collected every other week on the same day as trash on weeks highlighted in red. Holidays marked in blue will delay recycling and trash one day.

Back to School Safety Reminders for Drivers & Students

With the start of another school year, drivers are reminded to be on the lookout for students who may be walking or bicycling to or from school, waiting for the school bus or who have just exited the bus.

The National Transportation Safety Administration offers these reminders for drivers:

- When backing out of a driveway or leaving a garage, watch out for children walking or bicycling to school.
- When driving in neighborhoods with school zones, watch out for young people who may be thinking about getting to school, but may not be thinking of getting there safely.
- Slow down. Watch for children walking in the street, especially if there are no sidewalks in the neighborhood.
- Watch for children playing and congregating near bus stops.
- Be alert. Children arriving late for the bus may dart into the street without looking for traffic.
- Observe the posted speed limit in school zones.
- Learn and obey school bus laws. It is illegal in Kentucky to pass a stopped school bus in either direction on a two-lane road if the warning lights on the bus are on. Learn the “flashing signal light system” that school bus drivers use to alert motorists of pending actions: Yellow flashing lights indicate that the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Motorists should slow down and prepare to stop their vehicles.

Red flashing lights and extended stop arms indicate that the bus has stopped, and that children are getting on or off. Motorists must stop their cars and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop sign is withdrawn, and the bus begins moving before they can start driving again.

While school buses remain one of the safest modes of transportation, parents are encouraged to talk with their children about bus safety and have them follow the following basic safety tips:

- Get to the bus stop at least five minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive.
- When the bus approaches, stand at least three giant steps (6 feet) away from the curb, and line up away from the street.
- Wait until the bus stops, the door opens, and the driver says that it's okay before stepping onto the bus.
- If you have to cross the street in front of the bus, walk on the sidewalk or along the side of the road to a point at least five giant steps (10 feet) ahead of the bus before you cross. Be sure that the bus driver can see you, and you can see the bus driver.
- Use the handrails to avoid falls. When exiting the bus, be careful that clothing with drawstrings, and book bags with straps don't get caught in the handrails or doors.
- Never walk behind the bus.
- Walk at least three giant steps away from the side of the bus.
- If you drop something near the bus, tell the bus driver. Never try to pick



it up because the driver may not be able to see you.

In addition, students should avoid roughhousing and loud conversations on the bus which can be distracting to the driver.

City Hall Elevator Temporarily Out-of-Service

The elevator in the STM City Hall building is not operating at this time. Due to its age, it is necessary to modernize the working mechanics by replacing numerous components. The city is currently working with contractors to resolve this issue, and it is the city's goal to have the elevator operating safely again by September.

City Hall offices are still accessible to the public by use of the stairs, however, if you are unable to maneuver the stairs for any reason, and need in-person assistance at City Hall while the elevator is out of service, please telephone the city hall administration office 895-9444 in advance of your visit to the building, administration staff will make arrangement to have someone meet with you on the first floor.

Safety Tips

We would like to give a gentle reminder to secure your vehicles and remove personal belongings from plain view when leaving vehicles unattended.

Theft from vehicles is an ongoing problem throughout the county. To keep your valuables safe, remember to:

- Lock your doors and roll up the windows – suspects often look for unlocked cars, especially in poor weather when there are fewer people out of doors to notice suspicious activity



attract a thief. It is important to keep personal documents, checkbooks, and driver's licenses in your possession at all times. Don't leave gift cards in the car.

- Turn off your car – never leave the car running or left unattended; take the keys out of the ignition or fob out of your car
- Take your valuables – don't leave anything of value in the vehicle or in plain sight. Even a cupholder can
- Hide your things – if you can't carry everything with you, hide them in the trunk or under a seat out of view
- Keep your keys or fob with you – especially if there is someone at home that you don't want to have access to the car when you are not there
- Park in secure areas – keep your vehicle in the driveway or garage. Avoid parking on the street, if possible, and choose street parking in well-lit areas or under motion activated lights
- If you have an alarm, don't forget to activate it.

Pool Closing Tips

MSD offers these other important guidelines to follow as you drain your swimming pool this summer:

- Discharge water slowly, at no more than 30 gallons per minute, to prevent overwhelming public water quality treatment center assets, soil erosion, flooding, or damage to adjacent properties, including backups into homes and businesses.
- Do not drain your pool during or up to 48 hours after a rain event.
- Drain just one pool at a time.
- The pool should sit at least 10 days after chemical treatment before draining any water.
- Test the pool water to ensure that it is essentially chlorine-free prior to draining (about 0.1 parts per million total chlorine). Bubbling, cascading, or other forms of aeration will help to remove chlorine from water.
- The pool's pH should be in a normal range of 6 to 8 prior to draining.
- Call MSD's Industrial Waste Department at 502-540-6917 with any pool draining questions.



Friendly Reminders

Maintaining grass alleys in St. Matthews can become an issue. Property owners are responsible for cutting the grass behind their property and keeping any brushes and brush from growing beyond their fence into the alley way. They are not to use the area to dispose of debris which can be put out with their normal garbage for pick-up.

Please be aware that bushes are to be kept trimmed back from sidewalks and from corner lots so that a driver in a vehicle can see any cross traffic that may be coming.

You can dispose of yard waste from gardens, etc. with your weekly garbage pick up. Put the debris in a container marked Yard Waste (FREE Yard waste Stickers available at City Hall), use a paper yard waste bag, or bundle yard waste and sit it at the curb. NO plastic bags.

Fire Safety for Persons with Disabilities

Understand Your Fire Risk

- Having physical or mental disabilities doesn't mean you can't keep yourself and your family safe from fire.
- Build your home safety plan around your abilities.

Install and maintain smoke alarms

- Smoke alarms with a vibrating pad or flashing light are available for people who are deaf or hard of hearing.
- Smoke alarms with a strobe light outside the home to catch the attention of neighbors, and emergency call systems for summoning help, are also available.
- Ask the manager of your building, or a friend or relative, to install at least one smoke alarm on each level of your home.
- Test smoke alarm batteries every month and change them at least

once a year. If you can't reach the test button on your smoke alarm, ask someone to test it for you.

Live near an exit

- Although you have the legal right to live where you choose, you'll be safest on the ground floor if you live in an apartment building.
- If you live in a multistory home, arrange to sleep on the first floor.
- Being on the ground floor and near an exit will make your escape easier.

Plan your escape

- Plan your escape around your capabilities.
- Know at least two exits from every room.
- If you use a walker or wheelchair, check all exits to be sure you can get through the doorways.
- Make any necessary changes, such as installing exit ramps and

widening doorways, to make an emergency escape easier.

Don't isolate yourself

- Speak to your family members, building manager or neighbors about your fire safety plan and practice it with them.
 - Contact your local fire department's nonemergency line and explain your needs. They can suggest escape plan ideas and may perform a home fire safety inspection if you ask.
 - Ask emergency providers to keep your needs information on file.
 - Keep a phone near your bed and be ready to call 911 or your local emergency number if a fire occurs.

The Alexander Hamilton Historical Society of Kentucky


The Alexander Hamilton Historical Society of Kentucky meets every 3rd Saturday of the month at 10:30 am.

We will also stream the meetings on ZOOM. To participate via Zoom, email (lauvepoche@att.net) and we will send you the invitation needed to sign in.





The Chamber of St. Matthews and the City of St. Matthews are presenting a movie series at Voll Field at Community Center Park.


All movies are on Friday evenings and are free. There will also be concessions available.

Parks Update

The Parks Committee has had several meetings to discuss a long-range plan for the city's parks. Some of the items are small, while several are grand and will take a few budget cycles to implement.

In this year's budget, Brown Park should see the replacement of the two bridges over Beargrass Creek. Additionally, a new trail is going to be constructed in the back section of the park along Interstate 64. The current asphalt paths will be removed and replaced with concrete, as the asphalt doesn't hold up as well when the park floods.

A restroom at Warwick Park is being considered, similar to the one installed a few years ago at Brown Park. The construction schedule is



contingent upon the completion of a master plan.

The Parks Committee is finalizing a long-range plan to present to the Mayor and city council for future budgets. The intent is to develop an overall master plan for Warwick, Draut, and Brown parks so that the individual projects can be prioritized and implemented accordingly.

This summer and winter, major work is continuing on the upgrade of the St. Matthews Community Center and adding new parking. The exterior work has been started, and when it has been completed, the interior work should begin after the winter holidays.

Reminder: All of our city parks are equipped with pet waste disposal stations. Please clean up after your pets.

Your Works at Works

We have been working hard through the heat to keep our public spaces operational. Hopefully COVID is behind us and we can move forwards with normalcy. Since the last newsletter, the following has been accomplished:

Completed Projects

- Completed maintenance and checks to all irrigation systems, and have them up and running
- Removed several dead trees in our city parks to make sure that common areas remain safe
- Spruced up the Parks—Crews cleaned up landscaped areas, re-mulched, and planted new plants and shrubs
- Maintained all the green spaces in parks and right of ways

- Installed Rip Rap in ditch off Kentucky Avenue
- Patched pot holes on many city streets
- New sign at Ten Pin Lane completed

Current Projects

- Drainage Improvements on Trinity Hills Ditch – Currently in design and awaiting ACOE review and approval
- Culvert Replacement on Trinity Hills – Construction expected to be completed August of 2021
- Community Center Renovation Project – Construction on site work expected to start July 2021. Interior Construction expected to start December 2021
- Phased street sign replacement

- Sears Ave Drainage and Roadway Improvements – Construction Expected to start August 2021
- Drainage Improvements to Girard Drive design

capital projects. He works with the city council to determine capital projects for that year and then he is tasked with implementing them. He works with architects, engineering and construction firms to get projects completed. Some of his larger projects include the City Hall renovation and library expansion (2016-18) which was a \$10 million dollar renovation.

In 2019, he worked with Trinity High School on their baseball stadium. The stadium is on city property and Trinity leases the property from the city. One of the bonuses of that project is that the St. Matthews Little League uses the stadium for some of their games, and the kids enjoy playing at the big stadium, which seats roughly 3,000.

You can also thank Kenan for your nighttime peacefulness as he worked on the quiet zone with CSX and the

railroad at his former position with the consulting firm. They were able to get the quiet zone established for the city limits of St. Matthews.

At any given time, Kenan says that there are three or four capital projects going, and he also has numerous drainage and roadway projects that he supervises. He also oversees the maintenance for all of the parks, which include Brown Park, Draut Park, Community Center Park and Warwick Park. Park projects

have included building restrooms, building trails and maintaining trails.

As part of his role as assistant to the city engineer, Kenan also works with residents to ensure they are in compliance with zoning with home renovation and construction.

“Whenever we have a project completed, seeing residents being able to enjoy the amenities that the city is able to provide is one of the most rewarding parts of my job,” says Kenan.


