City of St. Matthews at Work for You! 2023 Highlights

The City has worked effectively and efficiently over the last year to be good stewards of city funds, while providing quality services, protection, and family-friendly activities. We are mindful of the needs of our residents and put ordinances and other measures in place to meet those needs.

St. Matthews Police Department

St. Matthews Police Department (SMPD) continues to maintain a high level of safety and protection, while offering services such as free House Watch for residents on vacation, on–site prescription drug disposal, and quick emergency response.

Some of the new initiatives of SMPD for 2023 include:

- Crime Mapping.
- Grant of \$88,000 for body worn cameras (tax dollars saved).
- QR code for Crime Tips.
- Flock Cameras.
- Full time victim services specialist.
- Grant of \$193,000 for new Tasers, handguns, and rifles, as part of department rifle program (tax dollars saved).
- New dispatch console and police radios.
- New website features and Front-Line program that allows users to input at-risk residents, report issues like downed road signs or roads that need attention, a pet database for lost pets, a bicycle database for lost/stolen bikes, and updated House Watch program that allows for email notification of home checks by officers.
- SMPD placed a School Resource Officer in the Kentucky School for the Blind with full reimbursement from the school.

Public Works

Public Works provides city-wide snow treatment, leaf collection, parks maintenance, tree planting, stump removal, as well as storm cleanup. Public Works also provides pothole repair and resurfacing of City streets.

Some of the larger projects by Public Works in 2023 include:

- 131 new trees planted throughout the City.
- Stream and basin improvements budgeted at Draut Park.

- Warwick Park Improvements: Budgeted new parking, new basketball court, new restroom, and four pickleball courts.
- Budgeted electric improvements at Brown Park.
- Drainage improvements to Girard Drive and Trinity Hills ditch.
- The Arterburn interior and exterior renovation.
- Street sign replacement throughout the City.
- Redesigned rain garden in Community Park.

City Council

The City Council established an Outstanding Neighbor Award to recognize residents who always go above and beyond, brought free events like Shakespeare in the Park to promote the Arts within our city, and retained the 40% tax discount on all property taxes paid by October 31.

Some of the accomplishments of the City Council in 2023 include:

- Enacted ordinances related to reckless driving and speeding contests to address illegal street racing and overnight parking in STM parks.
- Maintained an Ad Velorum tax of 20 cents per 100, with a 40% discount.

The accounting firm of Dean Dorton, the largest certified public accounting and professional business advisory firm in the Southeast, completed the City of St. Matthews audit, covering the year ending June 30, 2023. The completed audit was presented to the mayor and City Council members at the December 12 council meeting. The findings were positive, as they reported the City assets and revenues had increased from the previous year, and that the City of St. Matthews was in compliance with all responsible accounting practices. The city of St. Matthews continues to maintain the strong financial position it has sustained for decades. The detailed 2022-2023 audit is accessible on the City website under the Government tab.

Congratulations to Mayor Tonini on receiving the Jefferson County League of Cities (ICLC) Peyton Hoge Public Service Award, which is presented annually to an individual, or individuals, who demonstrate "extraordinary service, dedication and time to a Jefferson County Home Rule City, the JCLC and the Metro Louisville community." The award has been given since 1994 in honor of former City of Anchorage, Kentucky, Mayor Peyton Hoge III and is presented at the ICLC Annual Dinner each year.






Easy Being Green

Build a Bird Feeder

All it takes to get birds to visit your yard in winter is a reliable source of food. See which of these winter bird feeders you like best and make it this weekend!

Suet Bird Feeder

Suet, which can be purchased at most grocery stores, is the hard fat around the kidneys and loins of cows and sheep. Especially in the winter, suet is a source of heat and energy for insect-eating birds. You can make a suet bird feeder from a mesh



Milk Jug Bird Feeder

A water or milk jug winter bird feeder is easy to make and inexpensive. Rinse out the jug, cut open the sides, cut or drill holes for a thin dowel or chopstick perch, add the birdseed and hang it in a tree. You could decorate the plastic jug DIY bird feeder so it doesn't look like you've hung your recycling in your yard.

Empty plastic beverage bottles also make good winter bird feeders. All you need is a bottle, string, a screw eye and something for the perches—pencils, thin dowels, chopsticks and wooden spoons work well.

Crime Buzz

Prevent crime at gyms

Have you joined a gym as part of your New Year's resolution to become healthier? Add to your resolutions a commitment to crime prevention. Theft is a crime of opportunity. Most stolen items have been left unattended in plain sight in a public place. If you go to the gym:

- Leave personal items of value at home or keep them on you at all times.
- Use a lock on your gym locker.
- Never leave your bags, purses, wallets, or any possessions unattended even for a moment.
- Be aware of your surroundings when you go to the parking lot and report suspicious activity.
- Keep a written record of valuables, including descriptions and serial numbers. This is proof that the property is yours, and they will help in the reporting and recovery process.
- Always report missing or stolen property immediately.
- Keep cars locked. Do not leave valuables in plain sight in your vehicles. Don't leave unlocked and unattended cars running in cold weather to defrost windows or heat the car.

Cold weather crime

With winter fully upon us, it is tempting to leave vehicles unattended and running to keep them warm. Whether it's in your driveway or in the first parking space at the gas station, your vehicle presents an opportunity for crime to some people. Do not leave your vehicles running unattended! Keep vehicle doors locked. Theft victims often report to the



St. Matthews Police Department (SMPD) that their valuables were stolen from an unlocked vehicle. Simply locking doors can be one of the biggest deterrents to keeping valuables safe. In addition, do not leave valuables in plain sight, and do not leave weapons or extra keys in your vehicle.

Winter Driving Safety

Make winter driving safety a priority. Winter driving causes unique safety issues that call for an extra level of preparedness. Drivers should always carry an emergency kit in their vehicle that includes blankets, extra clothing, a flashlight, flares, jumper cables, a first aid kit, sand or cat litter for tire traction, a cell phone and car charger, a thermos of water, nonperishable food, ice scraper and snow brush, tire repair kit and pump, and a heat source such as candles and matches or heat sticks.

Drivers should practice safe winter driving preparation including being aware of weather conditions, removing snow and ice from the vehicle, and checking tires and wiper blades. Other good practices include keeping your gas tank at least half full, being cautious of black ice by slowly approaching turns, ramps, and bridges, and reducing speed and keeping space between your vehicle and other vehicles. Brake slowly and never slam on your brakes. Making driving safety a priority in the winter takes some planning but is worth the effort.

Hometown History

City of St. Matthews—In the Beginning

Local government finally emerged from the confines of the court system. Back in March of 1950, the sixth-class city of St. Matthews had incorporated. Immediately, the tiny, threeand-a half block municipality set its sights on annexing twoand-a-half quarter miles surrounding it. The additional area was projected to have a population of between 15,000 and 20.000 person, which would make the brand-new and bigger St. Matthews the largest sixth-class city in Kentucky. A remonstrance suit was brought to block the annexation but on June 2, 1951, Judeg Scott Miller ruled it could proceed. While opponents then went to the Kentucky Court of appeals, the trustees of St. Matthews (James H. Holand, Gilbert Flack, B.W. Gratzer, Henry Leathers, and T.S. Rudy) began to establish various boards and a police force, in addition to mailing out tax bills. At the same time, the YMCA housed in the old rectory of the original St Matthews Episcopal Church was renovated for a city hall. The first ceremony held in city hall was the swearing in of zoning commissioners by City Attorney C. Maxwell Brown on January 17, 1951. A few days later, The Courier-Journal (newspaper) aptly characterized the situation: "St Matthews May Not Know Where It's Going - But It's Going." When the Court of Appeals ruled in August 1951 against the annexation, St. Matthews was relegated again to measuring itself in blocks, not miles.

James H. Noland, who had been chairman of the trustee since St. Matthews had become a sixth-class city in 1950, continued as chairman of the council. Although he again reiterated that annexation would only be pursued where favored, in the fall of 1953 the City of St. Matthews moved to annex the business district as well as the adjourning two-square-mile area.

Based upon its increased population, the City of St. Matthews was upgraded from a sixth class to fourth class by the Kentucky General Assembly in 1954, the legislation taking effect on June 17. At a luncheon meeting of the St. Matthews Committee of the Louisville Chamber of Commerce at the Canary Cottage on Lexington Road on June 21st, Mayor James H. Noland outlined six project

that the city would undertake by virtue of its new powers, including establishing a police force, appointing an alcoholic beverage administrator, contracting for fire protection with the existing St. Matthews Volunteer Fire Department, and engaging in planning and zoning matters. The government itself would be substantially altered from it' previous five-member board of trustees to an eight-person council, presided over by a mayor. (St Matthews – The Crossroad of Beargrass, Samuel W.Thomas)

Code Words

Construction activity requires City Hall letter

Building permits are issued by the Louisville Metro Department of Inspections, Permits and Licenses, IPL, which can be reached by telephoning (502) 574-332 I.A "Letter of Compliance" however, is required from St. Matthews before a permit will be issued.

There is no charge for the "Letter of Compliance."To obtain a "Letter of Compliance" from the City of St. Matthews you must provide to the city engineer the following documents:

1) A completed "Application For Letter Of Compliance" form, available at

- the city administrative office, second floor of the St. Matthews City Hall, 3940 Grandview Avenue, between Breckenridge and Browns Lanes, or use our online form on our website: Business Tab>Letter of Compliance.
- 2) The name and address of any contractor or subcontractors who will be working on the project. All contractors and subcontractors must have a current City of St. Matthews business license, before a "Letter of Compliance" can be issued.
- 3) Two copies of the site plan, which is a scaled drawing of the property showing any existing buildings (including parking spaces) and the newer proposed building.



Please note that interior remodeling projects do not require a site plan, nor are property owners, who are performing the work themselves, required to have a business license.

Fire Safety Tips For Severe Winter Weather

- Never use candles for emergency lighting. Use flashlights and stock up on extra batteries.
- Make sure your smoke alarm has a backup battery.
- Use surge protectors. Plug only one heat-producing appliance (like a space heater) into an electrical outlet at one time.
- Consider unplugging appliances not in use.
- Connect appliances to portable generators with heavy-duty extension cords.
- Don't refuel your generator when it is running. Spilling gas on a hot engine can cause a fire. Keep portable generators outside, away from windows, and as far away from your home as possible.
- Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators or space heaters.
