

### Police Equipment and Safety Updates

### Officer Safety & Equipment

### Body Armor Grant

The SMPD received a grant from the Kentucky Attorney General's Office to replace body armor for officers with expired or soon-to-expire vests. With each ballistic vest costing approximately \$1,000, this grant provides essential safety equipment without impacting the city's budget.

### Radio Communications Upgrade

New portable police radios have been implemented to improve communication with the Louisville Metro Police Department (LMPD). This upgrade addresses previous limitations caused by LMPD's encrypted radio system and ensures better coordination during emergencies and joint operations.



### Fleet Modernization

### First Electric Police Vehicle

SMPD has purchased its first electric police vehicle, a 2025 Chevrolet Blazer EV PPV. This specially designed law enforcement vehicle supports the department's commitment to innovation and sustainability while offering lower fuel costs and reduced maintenance compared to gas-powered vehicles.

### New Vehicle Design

A fresh design for patrol vehicles is being implemented, starting with the new electric Blazer. All future marked police vehicles will feature this updated look, with existing vehicles transitioning over time. The redesign aims to increase visibility and recognition throughout the community.

### Seasonal Crime Prevention

With warmer weather approaching and its associated

increase in crime, residents are encouraged to take preventive measures.

### Vehicle Security:

- Lock all doors and close windows, even while at home.
- Hide valuables from plain sight.
- Park in well-lit areas with regular foot traffic.

### Home Security:

- Trim vegetation near windows and doors.
- Install sturdy locks and deadbolts.
- Use exterior lighting, especially motion-sensor lights.

- Stay informed about local crime trends.
- Report suspicious activities to SMPD (502-893-9000).
- Request extra patrols for specific concerns.
- Sign up for the free Reach Alert System for timely notifications: 877-307-9313.

### Scam Alert

Fraudulent toll-related text messages are targeting Kentucky drivers. These messages claim to be from agencies like RiverLink (which manages Kentucky-Indiana bridge tolls) and assert unpaid tolls requiring immediate payment.

### Warning Signs:

- Messages from "RiverLinks" or "Kentucky Toll Roads."
- Claims of unpaid tolls with payment links.
- Spelling errors like "overfee."

### Protection Tips:

- Never click unsolicited links.
- Verify toll status through official channels (riverlink.com or 1-855-RIV-LINK).
- Report incidents to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (ic3.gov).



• Contact your bank immediately if personal information was shared.

### Easy Being Green Particle Pollution – How can you help?

Particle pollution poses a growing, deadly threat to public health nationwide. Daily exposure can be fatal, with research linking long-term exposure to serious health effects throughout life.

### What is Particle Pollution?

Particle pollution refers to a mixture of tiny bits of solids and liquids in the air we breathe. Sources such as factories, power plants, and diesel & gasoline powered vehicles and equipment either directly emit fine particles or generate other pollutants, such as nitrogen oxides and sulfur oxides. Known as precursors, they can form into fine particles in the atmosphere. Other sources of particle pollution include wildfires, wood burning stoves, residential fireplaces and burning biomass for electricity.

## How can you help reduce Particle Pollution?

### Indoors

- Change furnace filters frequently.
- Only burn wood in fireplaces using seasoned wood & a certified stove.
- Consider using an air purifier with a HEPA filter.
- Choose energy-efficient appliances and electronics.

#### Outdoors

- Use electric lawn equipment when possible.
- Plant trees and shrubs to help filter air.



- Bike or walk for short distances.
- Ensure your car is properly maintained and tuned, and limit unnecessary car trips.
- Turn off your engine when idling.
- Carpool or use public transportation whenever possible.

## Hometown History

### St. Matthews Mayor Arthur K. Draut: A Life of Service



Arthur K. Draut (1924-2014) was a distinguished United States Naval officer, educator, and elected official who dedicated 38 years to public service in St. Matthews, Kentucky serving 16 years as City Councilman and 22 years as the city's third Mayor.

Born in Louisville as a fourth-generation Louisvillian to Walter and

Louise (Kammerer) Draut, he graduated from DuPont Manual High School in 1942. Upon graduation, Draut joined the U.S. Navy, serving as a radioman aboard the USS Wright during World War II military campaigns in the South Pacific. The Navy recalled him for a three-year tour during the Korean War in 1950. He ultimately retired from the Naval Reserves in 1968 at the rank of Full Commander after 26 years of service.

In his civilian life, Draut married Patricia Epperson in 1949, and together they raised three sons in St. Matthews. After earning his bachelor's degree from the University of Louisville, he began teaching at Eastern High School before transferring to the newly opened Waggener High School in St. Matthews in 1954. His educational career flourished there as he progressed from Dean of Students to Assistant Principal (1959) and finally Principal (1968). Under his leadership and supported by an exceptional teaching staff, Waggener High achieved national academic recognition. Students remembered him as a firm but fair leader deeply invested in their success. Draut retired from education in 1983 after 29 years of service. While still active in education, Draut entered politics in 1978 as a St. Matthews City Councilman. In 1984, his fellow councilmen appointed him Mayor following the death of Bernard F. Bowling, Sr. He served as Mayor for 22 years until 2007, when he returned to the city council for an additional eight years before retiring in 2014 at age 90.

In 1986, Draut helped establish an occupational tax that significantly increased city revenues, enabling St. Matthews to hire additional police officers, upgrade employee pensions, enhance city services, expand parks and amenities, computerize city records, and purchase the historic Greathouse School building for use as the current City Hall.

During his tenure as an elected official, St. Matthews saw remarkable development, including:

- Creation of five public parks.
- Implementation of a comprehensive drainage improvement plan.
- Initiation of sidewalk replacement and construction programs throughout the city..
- Installation of street lights for neighborhood safety.
- Launch of a tree planting program to enhance the city's tree canopy.
- Upgrading of the St. Matthews community center building, now named The Arterburn.

In recognition of his contributions, the city dedicated a 24.4acre wetland park on Bowling Boulevard to Arthur K. Draut in 1994. The park, featuring stone benches, walking paths, and the historic middle fork of Beargrass Creek. This park commemorates his enduring legacy of public service and commitment to our community.



## Code Words

### Be aware of noise levels

As the weather warms up, backyard barbecues, outdoor sports, and excited pets may increase the noise level in the community. Please ensure that your outdoor fun does not infringe on the right of your neighbor to enjoy reading a book with their windows open. Also, be aware that loud vehicle noises can also create a nuisance. Show that you care about your neighbors, by being aware of your noise level.

#### Use fireworks lawfully and safely

Though it is lawful to use some fireworks in the City of St. Matthews, that right comes with carefully planned guidelines to prevent endangerment to persons and property. City Ordinance 11 04, Section 1 details the type of fireworks that may be set off in St. Matthews. Section 5 of the Ordinance stipulates: "It shall be unlawful in the City of St. Matthews for any person, firm, corporation or other entity to use or detonate fireworks on private property in such a manner as to create a circumstance of wanton endangerment or disorderly conduct." It further stipulates that these fireworks must be consumer-grade, not display fireworks, such as those found at Thunder Over Louisville. To learn exactly which consumer fireworks may be detonated



on private property, look at § 93.35, Section I under Ordinances on the City website. The type of fireworks that may be detonated on public property is further listed in Section 5 (2).

### Good Neighboring

#### Mowing

With warmer weather comes grass mowing. When cutting grass, don't blow clippings into a neighbor's yard or the street. Remember to mow grass alleys and keep them clear so emergency workers can access utility poles. Keeping alleys cleaned out also prevents thieves or assailants from hiding there. Mowing them promotes good drainage and keeps down the rodent population.

#### Pet peeves

When you take your pet for a walk, remember that it must be on a leash and that St. Matthews prohibits electric collars as a substitute. Also remember to take a baggie along to pick up after your pet and dispose of those baggies in your own trash container or a public container only. Barking dogs can be another pet peeve. Allow your neighbors the peace they deserve and keep your dog quiet – especially after hours.

#### Slow down and keep clear

Spring and summer weather means more people, including children, will be outdoors. To do your part in keeping the neighborhood safe, be careful to note speed limit signs. Also, keep debris and vehicles from blocking sidewalks. Pedestrians need a safe place to walk without fear of tripping or being forced into the street.

## Your Works At Work

## Since the last newsletter, the following has been accomplished:

### **Completed Projects**

- Sediment was removed from Weicher Creek in Dupont area.
- Removed garbage along the stream in Community Center Park and Draut Park.
- Repaired water damage in the concession stand at Community Park due to a water line bursting.
- Foliage cleared in the rear undeveloped alleys in the Warwick neighborhood; please remember that residents are responsible for the property in the front and rear of their properties.
- Snow and ice treatment following multiple winter storms.
- Repaired numerous potholes as a result of winter weather conditions.
- Began mulching, weeding, and planting in all landscape beds around City Hall, parks, and common areas.

### Current Projects

- Annual tree planting program, estimated to plant 125 new trees to increase the city's tree canopy.
- Drainage improvements on Trinity Hills Ditch Project is under construction. Project completion scheduled for June 30, 2025.
- Phased street sign replacement project is ongoing.
- Stream and basin improvements at Draut Park Project expected to start late spring; delays due to permits. This will be phased construction that will last a year. Sections of the park are expected to be closed.
- Exterior improvements to The Arterburn. Construction underway.



- New restroom at Community Park near McCandless Field. Construction begins spring of 2025.
- Alley improvements between Massie and Gilman in design. Construction to begin late spring of 2025.
- Electric improvements at Brown Park in design. Construction to begin in July 2025.

### **Future Projects**

- Electric vehicle charging stations at City Hall and Library parking lots.
- Design of Phase II & III of Warwick Park improvements (new walking track, additional parking, updated pavilion and plaza, new playground and additional restroom).
